Ericka Dunbar SSBR Commitment Statement:

As an Africana biblical scholar, I am committed to research and activism that probes how Africana people engage, interpret, and are impacted by biblical texts. My current research explores African presence in the book of Esther as I note how African girls are among the virgin girls gathered and sexually trafficked by the Persian king. I compare this cultural trauma to the sexualized abuse and enslavement of Africana girls and women during the Maafa. This dialogical cultural study enables me to assess how the content of sacred texts, and ideologies and values embedded within, influence and impact the religious experiences of African diasporic peoples. Specifically, I excavate euphemisms, oppressive images, stereotypes and social and cultural attitudes regarding Africana female identity, and Africana identity more broadly, within the Bible and society to illustrate how these social myths and imaginings often justify and lead to violence and oppression. I plan to demonstrate commitment to the SSBR by: (1) Continuing to model and inspire ethically responsible and holistic interpretations of biblical texts that centers the African presence/identity in the Bible. (2) Continuing to evaluate the impact of biblical texts and interpretations of these texts on Africana/Black identity. (3) Utilizing intersectionality and polyvocality as frameworks to discover and critique the multiple layers of oppression, subjugation, and often silenced identity in religious and non-religious contexts. (4) Structuring classes that foregrounds Black religious experiences, Black scholarly voices, and perspectives, including contextualized biblical interpretation. (5) Publishing with a focus on Black religious experience.

As you will see from her CV, Dr. Fears has the requisite credentials for acceptance into SSBR. Her contributions to research and study of Black religion includes her ongoing analysis of the 19th century underground railroad as well as her very timely work in critical race theory.

As a religious educator, Dr. Fears' academic publications include reviews of a few works by current members of SSBR, articles in well-accepted journals within the area of religious education, an upcoming full manuscript and several book chapters. She has managed to accomplish this level of writing while maintaining a 3/2 course load at Howard University School of Divinity and continuous service as a hospital chaplain (admirable during this pandemic).

That is to say, she is someone we will enjoy working with - at a time when the work that we must do is intense, not as appreciated as we would desire, and even dangerous in some areas of this country. Society for the Study of Black Religion

It would be an honor to join in the mission of the Society for the Study of Black Religion (SSBR) to engage in scholarly research and the production of knowledge about the broad diaspora of Black religion and Black religious experiences.

As a womanist, the lens by which I seek knowledge is heavily dependent upon lived experiences, embodiment, community, partnership, and justice. By this, I mean to suggest that my religious and moral reflections place Black women at the center. This methodology for me is not only liberative, but places needed value on thriving and flourishing amid the oppressive systems at the intersections of race, gender, class, sexism, and heterosexism. The works of Katie Geneva Cannon, Delores S. Williams, and Emilie M. Townes have contributed to how I employ womanism as an interpretative principle. Further, womanist scholars and practitioners who have centered questions on human activity and our limited ability to fully partner with God through more just human relationships have influenced how I engage neighbors, faith communities, and the academy. Yet, my womanist formation refuses to submit to evil and suffering since my work and activities with God and creation are rooted in an emancipatory hope.

It is this justice-centered womanist rooting that is foundation to my work in theological education, and now in establishing new academic programs to meet the evolving needs of working professionals. I welcome the opportunity to join SSBR and be supportive of its work in convening scholars, committee responsibilities, and leading program efforts related to my scholarly and professional expertise. I am particularly interested in innovative ways to stretch imaginations on how knowledge is produced and valued among those in higher education, through narrative inquiry and evidence-based solutions for holistic wellness in black communities.

Dr. King is a 2021 graduate of Vanderbilt University Graduate Department of Religion/Religion, Psychology, and Culture. Dr. King was a fellow in the Theology and Practice Fellows program at Vanderbilt University, where she demonstrated that she is a disciplined scholar, an excellent teacher, and a reliable mentor with her peers and master level graduate students.

I was able to observe Dr. King's emergence as a scholar-practitioner when she served as the Teaching Fellow for the required Pastoral Theology and Care class. She is a patient, highly organized, and innovator pedagogue. She brought these same capacities working with me on the Annual Womanist Ethnography Conferences, first as a research assistant and as a fellow. In this role she was involved in every aspect of conference development—design, panelist selection, promotion, and budget. She is an invaluable colleague in this work.

Her research questions arose out of her experience with Black girls in counseling and advisement and her dissertation deftly traces the absence of Black girls in womanist thought and thereby re-evaluates the epistemological claims that undergird Womanist Practical Theology. It was an interdisciplinary, constructive, and a much-needed contribution to Womanist Thought and offers a way forward that takes Black girls' experiences seriously.

Dr. King's research is a distinctive contribution because Black girls have not been centered in theology, child studies, or womanist thought. Given the reality of racism, sexism, and the continued exploitation of women and girls in the United States and globally, her research is both timely and needed. Her dissertation, *Making Space for Black Girlhood: A Womanist Pastoral Theology* is a thoughtful articulation of a womanist pastoral theology of black girls lived experience. Kishundra tested, as it were, her argument, by presenting preliminary research at the 2017 Womanist Approaches to Religion/ Psychology, Religion, and Culture session at the

American Academy of Religion. The panelists who responded to her work were impressed with her presentation encouraged to publish her research.

She is currently at work on her first book and is expanding the research begun in her doctoral studies toward this publication.

It is my pleasure to nominate Dr. King for membership in the Society for the Study of Black Religion and I do so with my highest recommendation.



My Dear Colleagues,

It is with great pleasure that I nominate Rev. Dr. Valerie Miles-Tribble for membership in the Society for the Study of Black Religion. A tenured, full professor of the Graduate Theological Union, Rev. Dr. Miles-Tribble is also a community activist and ecumenical pastor, ordained in the American Baptist church, who has served several multid denominational congregations; and, since 2015, is pastor of the Faith Presbyterian Church in Oakland, California.

Miles-Tribble's work is grounded in the public-facing role of the historical Black church and lifts its sacred wisdom and vision alongside the keen social justice analyses and transformative commitments of the African American activist tradition. She teaches, writes, mentors and preaches drawing on the prophetic and liberative practices of the Black church – centering womanist/feminist, constructive and practical theologies, as well as spiritualities of Africa and the Afro-Atlantic world.

Miles-Tribble understands the crux of her work to be preparing and strengthening religious leaders for public justice ministry in what she calls “Black Lives Matter times.” Her writing offers models to clergy and others who are looking for ways to live out their alliance with the most vulnerable and assaulted in our society; to be in support of racial, economic, environmental and gender equity; and to heighten awareness of the complexity and challenge of being in the modern world while moving it, and ourselves, toward a greater ethic of human connectedness; toward restorative and visionary practices of democracy and of beloved community.

Her recently published book, *Change Agent Church: Urgency for Action in Black Lives Matter Times*, advocates for significant revisions of theological training toward encouraging, enabling and emboldening religious leaders as active witnesses in the work of fighting injustice and creating a transformed world. Miles-Tribble impels her readers, students and colleagues to move beyond gestures of tolerance toward authentic recognition of shared humanity. Her book received the GTU Borst-Rast Prize honorable mention award in 2021.

Rev. Dr. Miles-Tribbles will bring acuity, passion and collegiality to her involvement with the Society for the Study of Black Religion. I am happy and honored to recommend her admission to the organization.

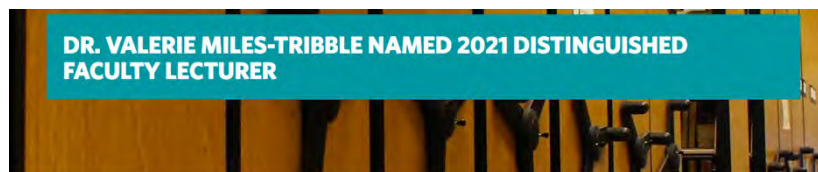

This lecture is aimed to focus a positive light on Women's Studies as a pathway or focus area of specialization that many graduate schools might have; yet we are under-utilizing this opportunity, even at the GTU? Across theological education, emphasis on Women's Studies in Religion can become a path to attract diverse voices to raise new lenses of scholarship, ministry, and justice praxis. As the outgoing chairperson of GTU-WSR, I want to raise some observations about credible contributions that Women's Studies in Religion could offer if amplified to encourage women and (men) to examine intersectional disparities and non-traditional approaches. I suggest that faculty and students can be more intentional to forge pathways that take seriously the justice issues continually raised by intergenerational and interfaith voices beyond binary presumptions that inhibit identities and otherwise, limit the authenticity of diversity and equity.

Dear Nomination Committee,

It gives me great pleasure to nominate Dr. Anthony Sean Neal for membership into the SSBR. To facilitate his nomination, I will briefly mention my relationship to Dr. Neal, highlight some of his contributions to the field of religion, and identify what I believe he will contribute to the society, if his nomination is successful.

First, I have known Dr. Neal for at least ten years or more, presenting papers with him at several conferences. These events include the AAR in San Diego (2013), where we delivered papers for the Black Theology Group, and the *Carl Spain Center on Race Studies & Spiritual Action* at Abilene Christian University where we participated, along with Molefi Asante, in a conference addressing the problem of race in America. Dr. Neal and I have continued more informal, critical conversations outside of such events, particularly since we both do our thinking in ecumenical and inter-religious directions in the same Christian tradition.

Secondly, what stands out about Neal's work, among other things, is his attention to the life and thought of Howard Thurman. His seminal contributions on Thurman's mysticism, including *Howard Thurman's Philosophical Mysticism* and *Common Ground: A Comparison of the Ideas of Consciousness in the Writings of Howard Thurman and Huey Newton*, are shaping the still burgeoning thought that surrounds Thurman's prodigious documentary record. His support of the work of Walter Fluker and his recent Dean's Eminent Scholar Award from Mississippi State University testify to his importance in the field and classroom.

His work in the field of black philosophy and black religion epitomizes the founders' intentions for establishing the SSBR. As you know Dr. Charles H. Long, for example, accented the importance of having SSBR members who represent a range of disciplines that embrace black creative ascetics within the context of the Atlantic world and beyond. In my mind, Neal's thinking and contributions honors the best ambitions of our society and its efforts to negotiate the powers and possibilities for the affirmation of black life in America. I support his nomination without reservation, knowing we will embrace a colleague who will contribute to the rich intellectual space that has been cultivated by the Society for the Study of Black Religion (SSBR).

During my years as an undergraduate student at Morehouse College, I made the personal decision to commit myself to the highest levels of scholarship. I was not content with being just another good student, but I also wanted to produce meaningful scholarship, which I considered to be my part in the tradition of the Black freedom struggle. In fulfilling this personal commitment, I finished my Morehouse years as the top student in my department. I was then commissioned as an Officer in the Navy Chaplain Corp. Since finishing my doctorate in 2012, I have furthered my scholarly commitment by writing two books on Howard Thurman which have both been well received. I have authored seventeen articles and book chapters. I have won an alumni award from Mercer University and I was inducted into the Collegium of Scholars of the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Chapel at Morehouse College. I also made a conscious decision to go back to the State in which I spent my childhood and take a position at one of the major universities there, making me the first African American in my department and the only African American tenured philosopher to ever teach in Mississippi. I am also a former president of the Mississippi Philosophical Association and I hold a board position with the American Philosophical Association. I list these examples as a demonstration of the commitment I bring to Academia in general and it is this same commitment that I will bring to the Society for the Study of Black Religion.

She is currently in her extern year as part of our Theology and Practice Program in the Graduate Department of Religion at Colgate Rochester Crozier Divinity School as Visiting Instructor of Ethics and Society.

I have known Shatavia since 2011 when she entered Yale Divinity School—I was on the faculty at that time.
